### Federal Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act

### Nightwalkers Escort Service

Sponsored and trained by the Department of Public Safety, student volunteers provide walking escorts anywhere on campus for members of the Longwood University community during the academic year. Volunteers also walk hourly patrols of the campus and residence halls and report any safety or security concerns to the Department of Public Safety.

## Campus Safety and Security Report 2006

At Longwood University, campus safety is the shared responsibility of students, faculty, and staff. We have a relatively secure community, but it will remain safe only if each and every person takes responsibility to protect him or herself and of those around them. This brochure contains important information on campus safety and crime prevention resources. Please take the time to learn more about what you can do to maintain the safest possible learning, living and working environment. Students, as members of the Longwood community, are encouraged to report crimes, conduct standard violations, and incidents in a manner consistent with the expectations of the Honor System.

This brochure is distributed annually in partial compliance with the Clery Act (formerly the Campus Security Act of 1990 and the Higher Education Act of 1992 and 1998). ### Timely Warning regarding Campus Security Risks.

The University distributes timely notices of certain crimes so that students, faculty, staff, and others are made aware of any continuing risk. Information is disseminated through campus publications, flyers, e-mail, and other means as appropriate.

### Reporting Crimes and Emergencies on Campus

Emergencies, crimes, or suspicious activity should be reported immediately to Public Safety and, when applicable, to Residential and Commuter Life staff members. Call Public Safety or pick up any of the blue security phones on campus. ### Department of Public Safety and Campus Police

Through law enforcement efforts and crime prevention programs, the Department of Public Safety contributes to the safety and security of the Longwood community. There are a number of full-time police officers in fully equipped vehicles or on foot. The officers monitor academic and administrative buildings, parking lots, and residence halls, and provide security for special public functions. Officers also conduct programs on topics such as self-defense, securing your property, and substance abuse as part of the University's comprehensive crime prevention efforts.

Campus police officers are vested with full law enforcement authority and can make arrests and conduct criminal investigations. Officers receive mandated training through the state criminal justice programs and specialized training in such areas as crime prevention, first aid, firearms, evidence gathering, defensive tactics, substance abuse, and sexual assault issues.

Consistent with Longwood's Scope of Authority Statement in Cooperative Agreement with the Town of Farmville, students and organizations engaging in off-campus criminal activity may be subject to University disciplinary sanctions and formal legal action. The Campus Police regularly collaborate with the Farmville Police Department, the Prince Edward County Sheriff's Department, the Virginia Alcohol Beverage Control (ABC) Department, and the Virginia State Police. Longwood also reports monthly crime statistics to the Federal Bureau of Investigation and yearly statistics to the U.S. Department of Justice.

## Personal Property

Members of the Longwood University community are encouraged to protect their personal property by keeping a detailed inventory of valuable items and maintaining adequate insurance. Engravers may be borrowed from the Department of Public Safety.

## Alcohol and Other Drugs

Longwood University is dedicated to fostering and sustaining a meaningful learning environment where the highest academic and personal standards are affirmed. Because the campus community values and supports activities that are educationally purposeful, healthy, safe, and conducive to producing well-rounded, effective citizen leaders, the illegal use and/or abuse of alcohol or other drugs will not be tolerated. All students, employees, guests, organizations and sponsoring groups, therefore, are required to abide by local, state, and federal laws and ordinances and University regulations governing the consumption of alcohol and control of illicit drugs. Violators will be held accountable for their actions and subject to the full range of available legal penalties and institutional sanctions. The University's commitment to the total well-being of its students is also furthered through a broad array of prevention and intervention programs, services, and resources that encourage healthy lifestyles and the lawful, low-risk use of alcohol. The University's comprehensive substance abuse prevention program includes orientation activities, educational workshops, and support groups. Detailed policies and procedures concerning alcohol and other drugs, health risks, and education and treatment resources are distributed annually to all students and employees.

## Sexual Assault

Sexual Assault is a crime as well as a violation of the University's Standards of Conduct. Sexual assault survivors are advised to seek medical attention and encouraged to report the crime to the police or University authorities. Staff members are available to assist survivors in accessing medical assistance, counseling, making alternative living arrangements, and reporting the incident. To report an incident or receive information or assistance, contact the Department of Public Safety, the Office of Honor and Judicial Programs, or a Residential and Commuter Life staff member. If a sexual assault survivor chooses to take further action after reporting the incident, there are several options for adjudication available. In addition to disciplinary action taken by the University (which may result in suspension or dismissal), assailants can be prosecuted under Virginia criminal and civil statutes. Victim assistants are available through Public Safety. Medical assistance is available through Health Services and the local hospital. Counseling support is available from the Counseling Center or local mental health professionals. For more detailed information, refer to the [Student Handbook](#). The University's sexual assault prevention efforts include orientation, educational workshops, and awareness activities such as sexual assault prevention month. Ongoing training is also provided to faculty, staff, and student resources (Resident Assistants, Peer Helpers, Wellness Advocates).

## Access and Security

The Department of Public Safety works with the Facilities Management Department to maintain security in University buildings and residence halls. Walkways, parking lots, and areas around campus buildings are lighted, and security phones (painted blue) connected to the Police are located throughout campus. Campus facilities and safety/security systems are inspected regularly. Safety and security hazards should be reported immediately to Public Safety, Facilities Management, and/or Residential and Commuter Life.

## Residence Hall Living

Access to residence halls is controlled by an access card. All student rooms are equipped with a telephone and door viewer (peep hole), and all residence hall lobbies have telephones that may be used to contact Public Safety. All residents should be alert to safety concerns such as propped exterior doors or unauthorized guests. Professional staff members are available at all

times for assistance.

## Commuting to Campus

Students, faculty, and staff who commute to campus have particular campus safety concerns such as parking areas and evening access to academic buildings. Specific concerns can be addressed with Public Safety and other student affairs staff, including Residential and Commuter Life. Information on driving safety is provided throughout the year. Like other citizens, students and employees living off campus must know and follow the laws and regulations of their community. Safety concerns and suspicious activities should be reported to local police departments.

## Statistics, Definitions, and Additional Information

The following columns highlight crime and disciplinary statistics over the last three years. The Campus Security Act now requires that reportable crimes be broken down into four categories: on campus, non campus, public property, and students residences. The term "campus" means any building or property owned or controlled by an institution of higher education within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution and used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to, the institution's educational purposes, including residences halls; and property within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution that is owned by the institution, but controlled by another person, is used by students, and supports institutional purposes (such as a food or other retail vendor). The term "non campus" means any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization recognized by the institution; and any building or property (other than a branch campus) owned or controlled by an institution of higher education that is used in direct support of, or in relation to, the institution's educational purposes, is used by students, and is not within the same reasonable contiguous geographic area of the institution. The term "public property" means all public property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities, that is within the campus, or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus. Previously, on campus, non campus and student residences were reported as a single crime statistic for a given crime. Crimes that occur off campus property were not previously reportable. In the future, an enumerated crime that occurs on property immediately adjacent to, or within an area up to the far curbing of any street adjacent to campus property is now reported under the "public property" category.

There was a significant increase in the number of burglaries reported in 2006. This was the result of a clarification issued by the U.S. Department of Education regarding the reporting standards. The clarification affected the burglary statistics of campuses nationwide. Burglaries now include thefts from rooms or other private areas where an unlawful entry may have occurred even where there may not be any evidence of a forcible "break-in."
