## **Assistant Professor of Anthropology & Archaeology**

Longwood University, a historic public liberal arts institution and host of the 2016 U.S. Vice Presidential Debate, invites candidates to apply for Assistant Professor of Anthropology & Archaeology.

A comprehensive university with a strong liberal arts foundation, Longwood has a distinctive mission to develop citizen leaders who are prepared to make positive contributions to the common good of society. Founded in 1839, Longwood is the third-oldest public university in Virginia and is part of the proud tradition of higher education in the Commonwealth of Virginia. Roughly one hour's drive from Lynchburg, Charlottesville and Richmond, Longwood is located in the historic two-college community of Farmville, at a historic crossroads near where the Civil War drew to a close and powerful strides in the civil rights movement began. Today, Longwood has more than 5,000 undergraduate and graduate students and more than 34,000 alumni. It maintains affiliations with the neighboring Robert Russa Moton Museum of civil rights history and the Longwood Center for Visual Arts, one of just a few dozen nationally accredited university art museums. A member of the Big South Conference, Longwood competes at the NCAA Division I level. Longwood's 26th President, W. Taylor Reveley IV, took office in June 2013.

The Anthropology and Archaeology Program at Longwood University is a four-field program that combines cultural anthropology with an active archaeology field program. The Department seeks a generalist who is able to teach both introductory Archaeology and Cultural Anthropology courses in the new Civitae Core Curriculum, an Archaeology Lab Methods or Cultural Resource Management (CRM) course, Indians of North America and one or more other ethnography or "peoples" courses of the candidate's choosing, and advanced topics courses other than religion and gender. This position involves teaching four undergraduate courses per semester. The successful candidate will also be expected to advise students, participate in departmental, college and university service, and engage in ongoing scholarly activity. The successful candidate will have a Ph.D. in Archaeology or Anthropology and a strong commitment to undergraduate teaching. Candidates who are ABD with a firm defense date will be considered.

Salary is competitive and commensurate with experience. Commonwealth of Virginia benefits accompany this position. A successful criminal background investigation is required. Position will be posted a minimum of five business days. Review of applications will begin immediately and will continue until the position is filled. AmeriCorps, Peace Corps, and other national service alumni are encouraged to apply.
