Knowledge Quest

If you

- Believe in “PD on the page”
- Have highly successful or innovative practices to showcase, particularly for responding to contemporary challenges
- Are interested in bringing research alive for practitioners
- Bring a perspective that is not yet well represented in the literature

Then you may want to consider writing for *Knowledge Quest*.



Knowledge Quest General Info

- Offers substantive information to assist building-level school librarians, supervisors, library educators, and other decision makers concerned with the development of school libraries
- Published bimonthly September through May (5 issues a year)
- Sent to all AASL members and *KQ* subscribers (approximately 6,000 individuals)



Knowledge Quest Author Guidelines

- Bias for action
- Focus on how school librarians are implementing programs/technologies/services and/or addressing issues in their school libraries
- Include information that can help other school librarians do their jobs/implement the program/technology/service in their school libraries
- Articles should be practical and include references to previous research and/or literature
- 1,700-2,500 words long



Knowledge Quest Submissions

- Original, unpublished manuscripts that address the integration of theory and practice in school librarianship and new developments in education, learning theory, and relevant disciplines
- NOT interested in basic primers on the role of the school library/school librarian, press releases, or vendor-focused articles
- DO NOT need to be tied to the feature topic for a particular issue



Knowledge Quest Manuscript Review Process

- Manuscripts undergo blind review by the *Knowledge Quest* Editorial Board in these areas:
 - Topic is relevant
 - Manuscript is well-written
 - Manuscript offers substantive information
 - Whether there are areas needed for improvement/expansion
- Process takes approximately 4-5 weeks after the manuscript submission deadline



Knowledge Quest Tips for Submitting

- Remember your audience!
- Think about the questions practitioners are asking (or those they should be)
- Start with “why,” but don’t leave out “how” and “what”
- Include stories of real school libraries to make new information accessible
- We’re looking for ideas that can be replicated and iterated, not just opinions
- Everything should be aligned with the *National School Library Standards* (though it doesn’t need to be “about” them)



School Library Research

If you

- Conduct original quantitative, qualitative or action research
- Conduct original research concerning the management, implementation, and evaluation of school library programs.
- Conduct innovative research that emphasizes instructional theory, teaching methods, and critical issues relevant to school libraries and school librarians

Then you may want to consider writing for *School Library Research*.



School Library Research General Info

- The scholarly, refereed research journal of the American Association of School Librarians
- Seeks to distribute major research findings worldwide
 - electronic publication
 - Internet links on the Web
- Primary audience for *SLR* includes academic scholars, school librarians, instructional specialists, and other educators
- Compiled on an annual basis



School Library Research Author Guidelines

- *SLR* invites original empirical or action research manuscripts focused on issues of school librarianship not submitted or accepted elsewhere
- Innovative or conceptual essays and extensive research literature reviews will also be considered
- Manuscripts average 15-30 double spaced pages
- Submissions should contain
 - 100–200-word abstract
 - Front page with title, author, and author’s contact info
 - Works Cited page (beginning Jan 2022, *SLR* will use APA 7th)
 - Tables and figures included at the end



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School Library Research Submissions

- Manuscripts are submitted for review through the *SLR* online submission portal
- Authors are encouraged to review the published author guidelines for submission requirements (length, contents, format, style)
- Each manuscript is acknowledged by the editors
- Manuscripts are published only after meeting the extensive review criteria
- The submission and review process normally takes eight to twelve weeks



School Library Research Manuscript Review Process

- Submitted manuscripts are reviewed through a “double blind” referee process.
 - 3-5 Editorial Board members review the quality of a manuscript
 - Reviewers are selected established professionals from library education and service
- Reviewer comments and recommendations are gathered in writing by the editor. The editors have final responsibility for action taken on manuscripts.
 - Rejection by the reviewers results in rejection of a manuscript from further consideration
 - The editors inform the author of reviewers’ recommendations for further revision
- Accepted manuscripts are placed online for public access
 - The acceptance date is included when a manuscript is added to the journal
 - A manuscript continues to be subject to review and comment from readers. Comments may be compiled by the editor and posted with the manuscript over time.



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School Library Research Tips for Submitting

- The guidelines are essential.
- Review articles in the journal.
- Look for authors that have published on similar topics.
- Apply old concepts in new ways.
- Collaborate to adapt your point of view.
- Rome wasn't built in a day.
- “No” does not mean you have not been successful.



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KQ Website

If you...

- Like writing shorter pieces on your school library practice
- Are interested in helping others improve their school library practice
- Have experience writing or blogging about your experiences as a school librarian

Then you may want to consider submitting an application to become a *KQ* blogger.



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KQ Website General Info

- Companion site to *Knowledge Quest* magazine
- Meant to provide shorter, more timely pieces on day-to-day issues in school libraries
- Content is cross-posted to AASL's social media channels
- New posts published daily (Monday through Friday)

Website receives more than 1,400 hits a day!



KQ Blogger Requirements

- Must be a current member of AASL/ALA
- Able to write shorter, practical pieces on school library issues (600-900 words)
- Provide writing samples and areas of interest
- Able to write monthly blog posts on topics of interest to school librarians and educators

Minimum one-year commitment if selected to be a *KQ* blogger.



Review Process for *KQ* Blogger Applications

- *KQ* Editorial Board reviews applications every quarter
- Applications are NOT blinded for review
- Applications are reviewed on a scale of 1 to 5 on quality of writing samples, relevance of applicant's areas of interest, level of involvement with AASL/ALA, and overall qualifications to be a *KQ* blogger
