Each year, the Foundation receives contributions that directly fund scholarships and programmatic initiatives across campus. These gifts, stewarded with care by our dedicated Board and staff, help grow our endowment and ensure that donor intent is honored with integrity and purpose.

We are proud to share that the Foundation closed its fiscal year on December 31, 2024, with \$121.3 million in total assets. For the academic year ending June 30, 2025, 822 students received 1,108 scholarships totaling approximately \$3.2 million.



This marks a remarkable milestone—our annual scholarship distributions have more than doubled over the past decade.

In addition, the Foundation provided \$7.5 million in institutional support for programmatic funding, further enriching the Longwood experience for all students.

Our Board is composed of passionate individuals—alumni, family members, former Rectors, and University representatives—who share a deep commitment to Longwood's mission. Through the work of our Finance, Governance, and Stewardship and Student Success Committees, and with the support of our exceptional Foundation staff, we continue to pursue initiatives that promote growth, accountability, and student success.

We are especially inspired by our Fellows, recent Longwood graduates now in their third year of service with the Board. Their energy and insight bring fresh perspective to our work and reinforce the transformative power of philanthropy.

I would also like to extend heartfelt thanks to Mary Larkin Thornton '88, whose term on the Board concludes this year. Her dedication and leadership have left a lasting impact, and we are deeply grateful for her service.

Scholarships as Catalysts for Student Success in the College of Education, Health, and Human Services

The College of Education, Health, and Human Services (CEHHS) at Longwood University prepares students to meet critical workforce needs across the Commonwealth of Virginia. From training teachers, nurses, and speech-language pathologists to supporting future social workers, counselors, and health specialists, CEHHS is dedicated to preparing students for high-demand, service-oriented careers. These professions strengthen schools, hospitals, clinics, and community agencies—yet many students face financial challenges that put their educational and career goals at risk. Scholarships play a vital role in ensuring students can access CEHHS programs, complete their studies, and graduate ready to serve their communities.

That’s why scholarships matter so deeply. They don’t just ease financial burdens. They open doors. Scholarships allow students to say yes to Longwood, to stay enrolled when things get tough, and to focus on their calling to serve.

SUPPORTING STUDENT SUCCESS

Tuition, clinical fees, licensure testing, and living expenses add up quickly for CEHHS students. Scholarships help reduce these barriers by making CEHHS programs accessible to students who otherwise may not have the financial means to attend. With growing shortages of teachers and healthcare

providers, scholarships ensure a pipeline of well-trained professionals ready to meet the needs of schools, hospitals, rural health systems, and clinics across Southside Virginia and beyond. Scholarships not only open doors to college education, but also help students remain enrolled.

Jessica Buracker, Social Work class of 2024, experienced this firsthand. “I received the Cover-Rowles Scholarship during my senior year internship where I spent over 500 hours working at a Child Advocacy Center. My experience there confirmed that being a social worker is what I was meant to do. I would not have had the focus and commitment to grow my skills without the Cover-Rowles scholarship, as I would have spent more time worrying about meeting my basic financial needs. Having some extra support was the foundation in my success at getting my BSW, especially as a low-income and first-generation college student.”

Financial support from philanthropy also ensures that faculty experts in CEHHS can support the needs of the region through service to the community and professional development. Programs such as the Southside Virginia Regional Technology Consortium (SVRTC, the Summer Literacy Institute—now in its 21st year), and the Institute for Teaching through Technology and Innovative Practices summer camps demonstrate how CEHHS aligns its academic preparation with workforce demands and community needs.

One example of this generosity is the ACE the Test Program, created in 2021 by an anonymous donor who recognized a specific need: the costly licensure exams teacher candidates must pass to enter the classroom. Over the last four years, this need-based program has provided \$136,000 to cover testing fees for 460 students. For each of these future students, the program lifted a financial burden and cleared the path to their careers.

These stories are more than anecdotes. They are proof of the benefit scholarships can make on students' lives. Across Virginia, communities face critical shortages of teachers, nurses, and speech-language pathologists. Our students are ready to answer that call, but they can only do so if they have the support to finish their degrees. Generosity shown through the variety of scholarships within the College of Education, Health, and Human Services ensures that Longwood graduates walk into schools, hospitals, and clinics prepared to make a lasting difference.

INVESTING IN FUTURE LEADERS

The mission of CEHHS is to educate leaders who are competent, caring, and committed to serving diverse communities. Scholarships reflect that mission by investing in the next generation of teachers, nurses, social workers, and health professionals who will shape classrooms, clinics, and communities for decades to come. Beyond financial support, many scholarships carry with them a vote of confidence in the student's potential, encouraging academic excellence and leadership.

Scholarships are essential to the success of CEHHS students at Longwood University. They reduce barriers to entry, support retention and licensure success, and prepare graduates to meet urgent workforce needs across the Commonwealth. By investing in scholarships, Longwood ensures that passionate and capable students—regardless of financial background—can complete their degrees and dedicate their careers to serving others. In this way, scholarships not only change individual lives but also strengthen the schools, hospitals, and communities that depend on CEHHS graduates.

Janet Wilson always knew she wanted to be a nurse — but life had other plans. For years, she worked as a medical assistant while raising her children and caring for her husband during his battle with kidney failure.

Eventually, she found herself asking, "Is there something more I'm meant to do?"

Janet's answer came with quiet clarity: go back to school — and because of your support, that opportunity was finally within reach.

She worried how she'd afford school — but at a new student welcome event, everything changed. That day, Janet learned her tuition and books would be fully covered through grants and scholarships like the Women's Legacy Fund.

"I was in tears," she says. "I had just lost my part-time job. I didn't know how we were going to do it. But they told me, 'You just need to get to class.' That support changed everything."

At that same event, she also had a moment she'll never forget. Staff assumed she was there for her daughter. "I smiled and said, 'No, I'm the student.' And they just started clapping."

Today, Janet is pursuing a nursing degree with a minor in health education. She's commuting from Blackstone, mentoring younger classmates, and has been honored with Longwood's Citizen Leader Award — a testament to the impact she's already making on campus.

"You're never too old to walk into your purpose," she says.

Now, she's looking ahead to a future as a public health or pediatric nurse — ready to be there for others, thanks to the support you made possible.

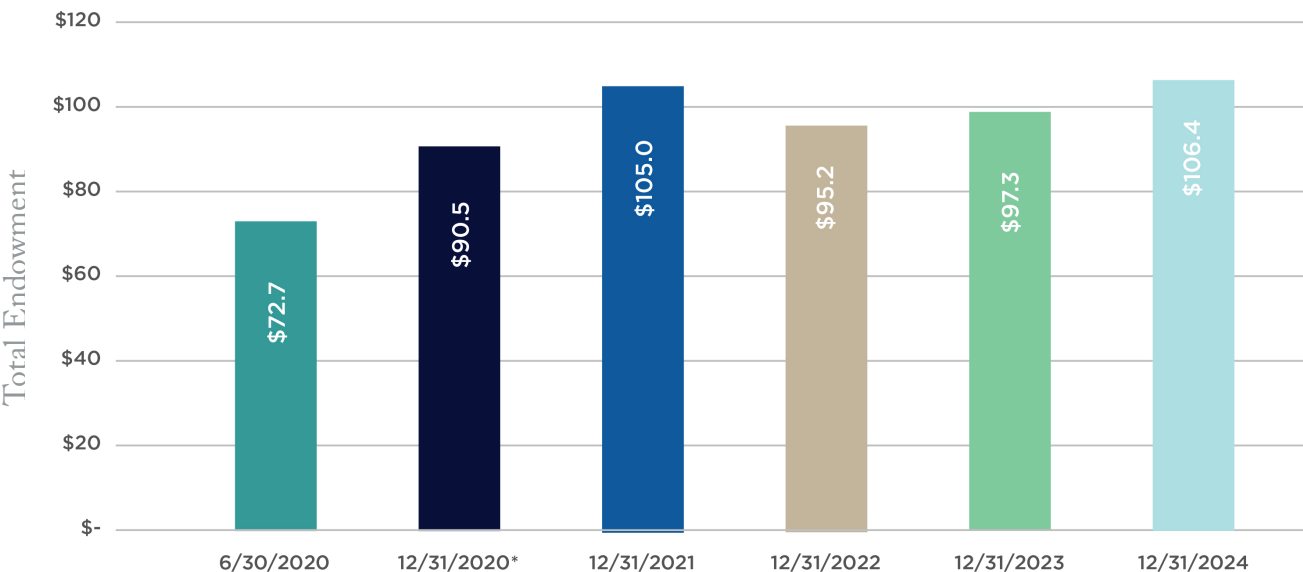

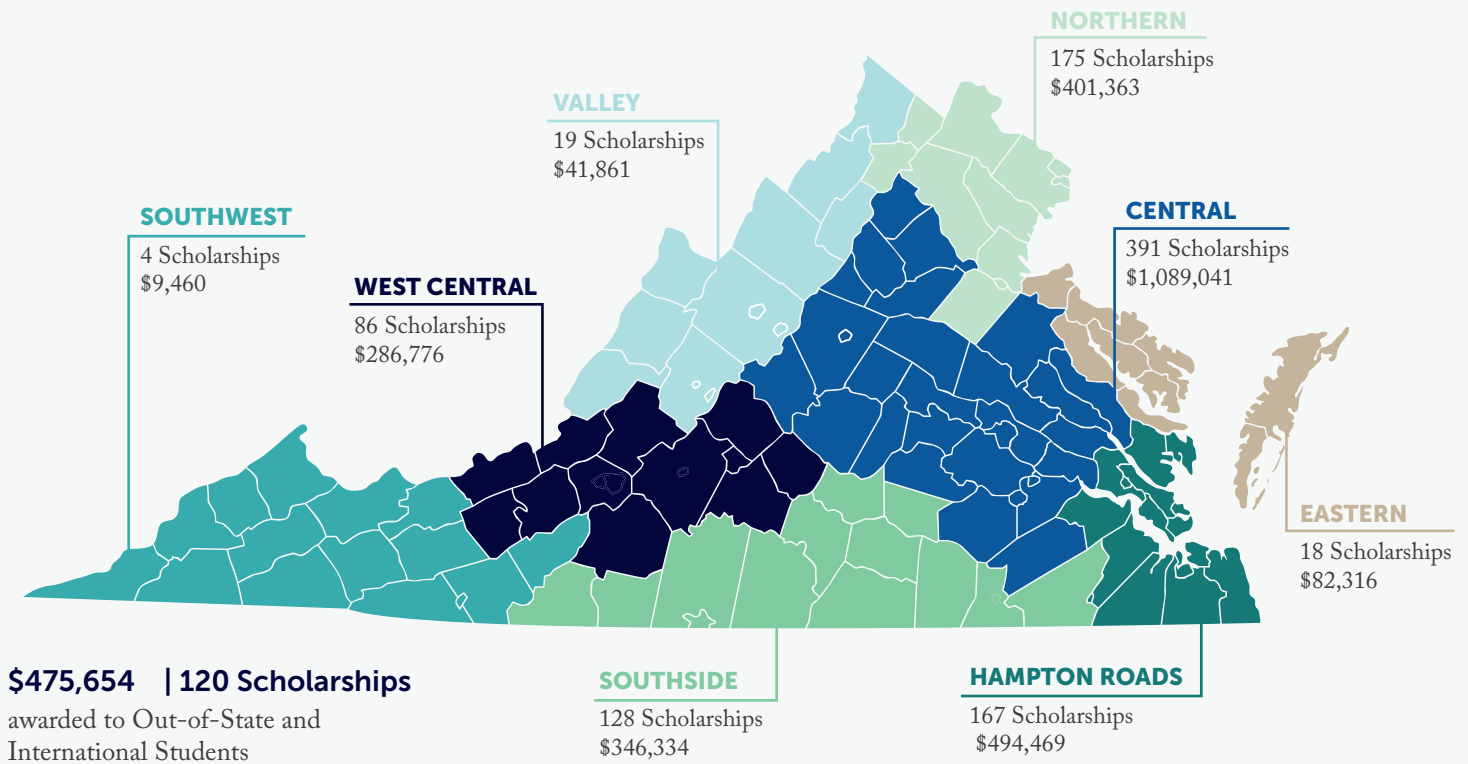

Transformative Learning Through the Brock Experiences

In 2006, a small group of Longwood University faculty launched an experimental course in Yellowstone National Park (YNP). What began as a modest field experience with just a few students grew into LU@YNP, a signature program that eventually spanned eight vans of students exploring civic issues in America's first national park. Its success inspired a bold question: could this immersive model work elsewhere? In 2016, the team piloted LU@AK in Alaska, proving the concept's adaptability. This milestone prompted Macon and Joan Perry Brock ('64) to make a transformational gift of \$5.9 million to establish the Brock Endowment for Transformative Learning.

CORE PRINCIPLES AND COURSE DEVELOPMENT

The Brock Experiences are built on three foundational elements: (1) an unresolved civic issue, (2) place-based learning, and (3) interdisciplinary teaching teams. These principles guide all Brock courses and shape faculty development, campus initiatives, and the Brock Leaders program. Since the endowment's creation, 11 courses have been developed, each rooted in these core values and designed to challenge students to think critically, engage deeply, and grow as citizen leaders.

To support course creation, the Brock Fellowship was launched. This two-year program helps faculty transform ideas into catalog-ready courses. It begins with the Chesapeake Bay Professional

Development Institute, where faculty explore civic issues like waterway stewardship. Fellows receive mentorship, travel with LU@YNP, and benefit from extensive professional development and course reassignment support. This structure has led to innovative hires and long-term departmental growth. For example, a photography fellow was replaced by a civil rights photographer who later joined the faculty full-time, enriching the department's offerings.

Unlike traditional course development, Brock Fellows must consider travel logistics, local partnerships, and team dynamics. The fellowship provides a half-time course reassignment for lead faculty, allowing them the space to build a transformative experience. This investment in faculty creativity and collaboration is central to the program's success.



STUDENT IMPACT AND SCHOLARSHIPS

Brock Experiences offer unmatched educational depth, but additional costs—summer tuition, travel, and program fees—can be a barrier. Scholarships from the Brock Endowment help students afford these transformative opportunities. Without this support, many would miss out on the life-changing impact of these courses.

Students often describe their Brock Experiences as pivotal. Tyler, a participant in the San Francisco “Being Human” course, overcame his fear of flying and thrived despite challenging genetics content. Now a high school music teacher, he returned to Longwood in 2025 for the New Orleans Brock Experience, integrating its lessons into his own classroom. His students were “locked in, engaged, and asking so many good questions.”

Madison, a student in the New Orleans course, wrote in her reflection journal: “Today was probably one of the most emotional days I’ve experienced...Walking through the plantation and houses helped me to better understand who I am and what my ancestors did in order for me to be here today...Our evening debrief this night was extremely heavy and powerful. It gave me a strength from the past that I never knew was possible to encounter.”

These stories illustrate how Brock Experiences not only educate but empower students to carry their learning into their communities and careers.

NATIONAL RECOGNITION AND INNOVATION

In 2022, Phi Kappa Phi honored the Brock Experiences with its Excellence in Innovation Award, recognizing how the program cultivates civic understanding and leadership. The \$100,000 prize supported LU@YNP and student scholarships, expanding access to these high-impact learning opportunities.

Faculty have also gained national attention. In 2025, Drs. Alix D. Dowling Fink, JoEllen Pederson, and Heather G. Lettner-Rust published *Experiential Civic Education*, a volume offering a replicable model for civic immersion courses. That same year, the Chesapeake Bay Brock Experience partnered with the National Collegiate Honors Council to host its first civic seminar, welcoming students nationwide and awarding academic credit to Longwood participants. The success of this pilot has sparked interest in future collaborations.

A LASTING LEGACY

The Brock Endowment has reshaped Longwood’s curriculum and culture. Brock Experiences are now central to the Civitae Core Curriculum, influencing course design across campus. Elements of “the Brock way”—such as foregrounding civic issues, interdisciplinary collaboration, and intentional reflective writing—are now embedded in broader academic practices.

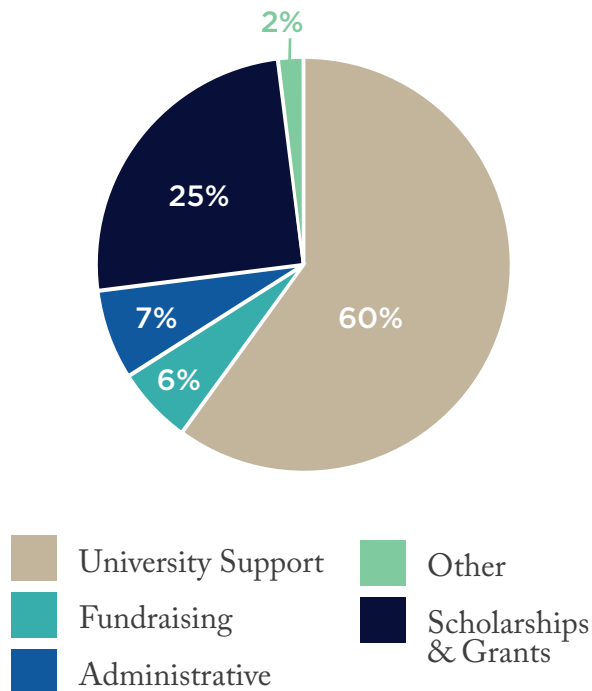

Financial Overview: A Year of Growth and Resilience

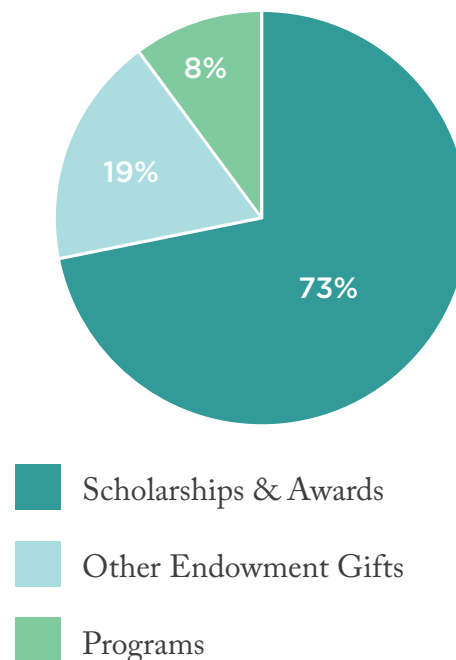
As CEO of the Longwood University Foundation, I am proud to share that the Foundation has continued to demonstrate resilience, strategic foresight, and an unwavering commitment to our mission: supporting students and academic excellence through scholarships and programmatic funding.

The Foundation's investment portfolio delivered a strong return for the year ending December 31, 2024. This performance continued through our academic year ending on June 30, 2025 and exceeded both our short-term and 10-year benchmarks. Our strategy of diversified investments—across public equities, private ventures, and through our trusted investment managers—proved effective in both protecting our assets and positioning us for continued growth.

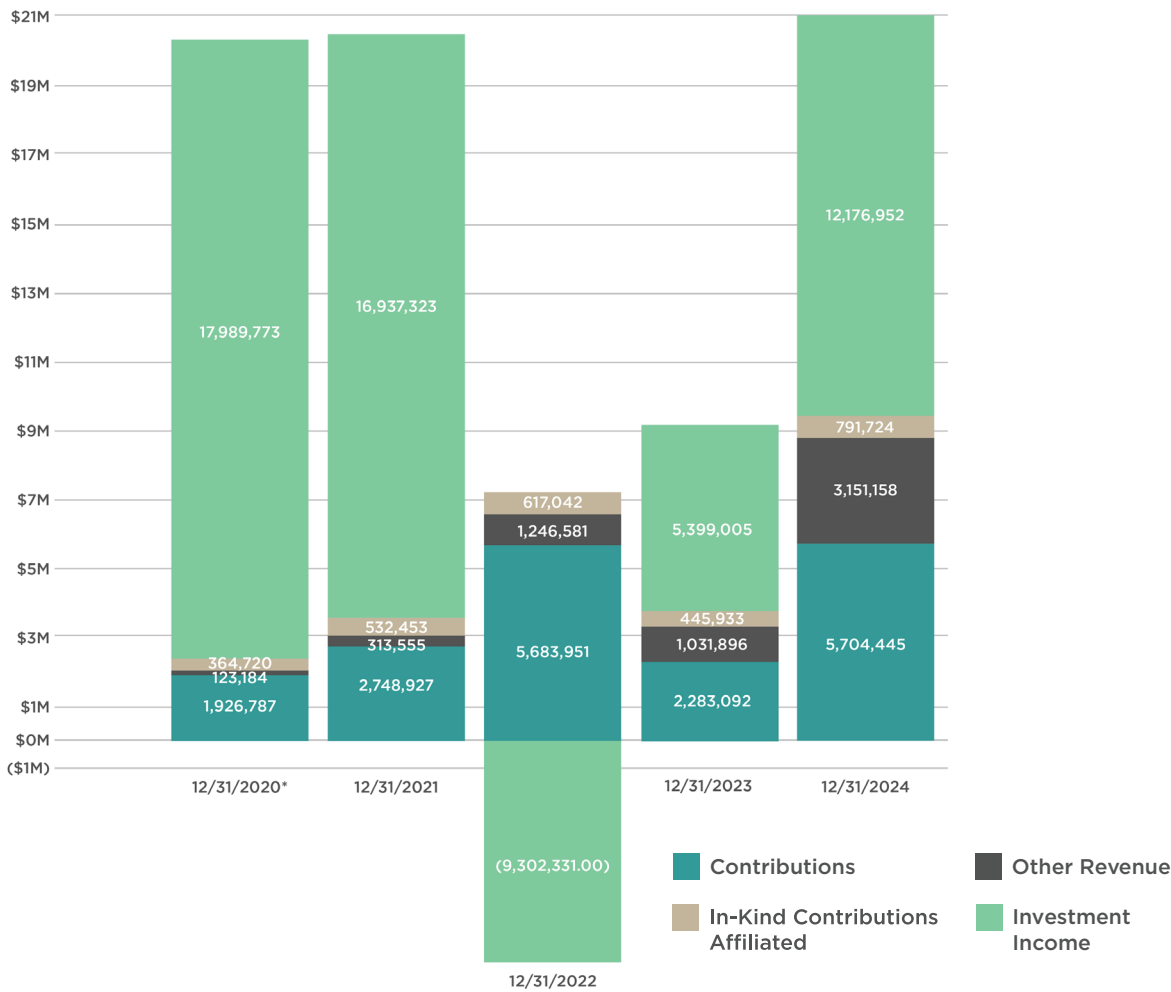


Total assets at December 31, 2024 equaled over \$121 million, a new record for the Foundation. Our endowment also continued to show gains, rising to \$106 million from \$95 million in the prior year. This achievement is a testament to the generosity of our donors and the disciplined stewardship of our investment team.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND PROGRAMMATIC SUPPORT: RECORD-SETTING IMPACT

In the 2024–25 academic year, the Foundation awarded a record \$3.228 million in scholarships to 822 students and provided \$927,000 in endowed program support to University departments. These figures represent the highest levels of support in our history—and we are poised to do even more. For the 2025–2026 academic year, we anticipate awarding \$3.4 million in scholarships and just under \$1.0 million in programmatic funding.

Our commitment to student success and academic enrichment is further exemplified by the \$3.0 million in revenue from the sale of wetland mitigation banking credits at Hull Springs Farm. These receipts, net of escrows, are regularly transferred to the University to be used for supporting operations and capital improvements at the Baliles Environmental Center, advancing both environmental education and sustainability.

CONTRIBUTIONS AND INVESTMENTS: BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE

In 2024, donor contributions totaled \$5.7 million. Gifts designated for immediate use were transferred to the University, while those intended for the endowment were invested to ensure long-term impact. Our investment returns outperformed short-term and 10-year benchmarks, and our strategy—focused on capital preservation and long-term growth—continues to serve us well. This is the same approach that also softened the blow of past market downturns.

Our external investment managers remain instrumental in executing a disciplined, risk-reward strategy that balances yield with principal preservation. Through active portfolio management and collaboration with qualified investment managers, we aim to achieve a 10-year average return that sustains our scholarship and administrative funding needs while offsetting inflationary pressures. We continue to believe our diversification and active portfolio management will play an important role in meeting our Foundation's targeted returns over the next five to ten years.

ADMINISTRATIVE EFFICIENCY AND RESPONSIBLE SPENDING

The Foundation Board remains committed to operational efficiency, maintaining administrative fees below 1.50% of the endowment annually. To ensure consistent support for students and programs, we base our spending on a 12-quarter trailing average, applying a 4% distribution rate. This approach smooths the effects of market volatility and ensures reliable funding year after year.

LOOKING AHEAD

The Foundation's financial results for 2024 reflect a year of meaningful returns from our investment portfolio and donor support. As we look to the future, we remain focused on growing our endowment through sound investment practices, prudent spending, and—most importantly—the continued generosity of our donors.

Together, we are making a Longwood education more accessible, more enriching, and more transformative for every student we serve. We are continuing to build a legacy of opportunity, excellence and growth to support generations of Longwood students to come.
