Course Information

Course Description:

This is a three-credit hour course. This course is designed to acquaint students with the phonetic structure of the English Language, its dialects and derivations, and application of the International Phonetic Alphabet. **With this being a three-credit hour course please acknowledge that this will entail 112.5 hours of work of the course of the semester. Break down: 37.5 hours will be of instruction and 75 hours will be used for studying, completion of assignments and projects, and reading outside of class.**

Detailed Assignment Descriptions:

Introduction Assignments:

Students will complete the assurance statement, canvas quiz, participation quiz, and introduction discussion board.

Exams:

Students will have three exams. The exams will include short answer, multiple choice, or fill in the blank pertaining to the course content. Additionally, students will transcribe words or phrases using IPA.

Quizzes:

Students will have weekly quizzes for ten weeks. These quizzes will be short and will be varied in format, depending upon the nature of the material. Quizzes might include transcribing, defining terminology, or outlining important points from the text or lectures. Each of the 10 quizzes will be worth 20 points.

Practices:

Students will complete weekly practice assignment located on canvas. There will be 10 total and will be graded based on completion. This will target transcription practice. Each practice activity will be worth 2.5 points. No partial credit will be given for incompletes.

Workbook:

Students will use their workbook and complete the posted activities. There will be 10 workbook assignments each worth five points. Students can submit an image of their completed activities on Canvas.

Book Transcription-Bee Bim Bop:

Students will listen to the story, Bee Bim Bop, on Canvas and transcribe what is read using broad transcription.

Final Transcription and write up:

Students will transcribe a conversational speech sample using broad transcription.
